

## RCSD Middle School Grade Survey

Dear Parents,

During the *Planning for our Future* community engagement process last fall, one of the 24 ideas considered as part of our 3-year plan to reduce the budget by \$10 million was to make all schools K-5 or 6-8. We heard a great deal of testimony about this particular idea, and public opinion was divided. My recommendation at the November 28 board meeting was to further study the issue before making any decisions about grade configurations.

### **Why it is important to consider K-8 versus K-5 and 6-8 structure**

How we organize our middle school classrooms may affect our operational costs. Maintaining a variety of grade structures (K-8, 6-8, 3-8) reduces our flexibility in assigning teachers and may mean we have to hire a greater number of teachers with no increased funding from the state. Just because changing grade configurations may save money does not mean we have to make the change, but it does mean that we need to hear from our community about how much they value the variety of grade options currently offered in our schools.

**The purpose of conducting this survey is determine how YOU feel about our current structure for middle school students.** The survey that follows gives you a chance to provide your input on a number of specific areas, and also provide your overall opinion.

Please understand that we are only gathering information at this stage. The results of this survey will be shared with the board at a public meeting, and the will consider your input and then decide whether or not they want to consider possible changes to our grade structure in the future.
